History of Father's Day

Father's Day is Sunday, June 20

On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday

sermon in memory of the 362 men who had died in the previous December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah, but it was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday.

The next year, a Spokane, Washington, woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She

went to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful: Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910.

Slowly, the holiday spread. In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by using telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane when he pressed a button in Washington,

D.C. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day.

During the 1920s and 1930s, a movement arose to scrap Mother's Day and Father's Day altogether in favor of a single holiday, Parents' Day. Every year on Mother's Day, pro-

Parents' Day groups rallied in New York City's Central Park.

When World War II began, advertisers began to argue celebrating Father's Day was a way to honor American troops and support the war effort. By the end of the war, Father's Day may not have been a federal holiday, but it was a national institution.

In 1972, in the middle of a hard-fought presidential re-election campaign, Richard Nixon signed a proclamation making Father's Day a federal holiday at last. Today, economists estimate Americans spend more than \$1 billion each year on Father's Day gifts.

This month we'll travel around Italy with Rick.

The Best of Sicily: This tour of Sicilian highlights starts in Palermo, where we'll sing with the merchants in the markets, join locals in their passeggiata, drop in on a contessa, and marvel at the Romanesque cathedral

of Monreale. Then we'll sip wine on the slopes of Mount Etna, enjoy cannoli, ponder Greek temples at Agrigento, admire Roman mosaics at the Villa of Casale, and marvel at the view from the Greek theater in Taormina.

Naples and Pompeii:

In this show, we go shopping Neapolitan style, dodge scooters in Naples' crazy traffic, explore the city's vibrant neighborhoods,



admire exquisite ancient mosaics at the National Museum of Archaeology, taste pizza in its birthplace, climb the lip of Mount Vesuvius, and wander the amazing ruins of the Roman town it destroyed: Pompeii.

The Amalfi Coast: In this program, we explore Sorrento's back streets, taste traditional Italian food, drive along the dramatic Amalfi Coast to catch some breathtaking scenery, learn the history behind the tourist shops of Amalfi, stroll in the shadow of Greek temples at Paestum, and sail to the isle of Capri to enter the fabled Blue Grotto.



National Say Something Nice DayJune 1



On July 31, 2011, the president and CEO of the Charleston, South Carolina Speech and Hearing Center, Mitchell Carnell, published a short Amazon book called Say Something Nice: Be a Lifter!

But it was before the publication of "Say Something Nice" that the idea germinated. In 2006, Carnell's work was officially recognized when the mayor of North Charleston, South Carolina proclaimed June 1 as Say Something Nice Day. Local and national Baptist and Presbyterian organizations joined in, and the day was formally recognized.

It's long been known that happy people live longer and are generally healthier. So, today, try to practice being positive from sunup to sundown.



Flag Day

June 14

When the American Revolution broke out in 1775, the colonists weren't fighting under a single flag. Instead, most regiments fought under their own flags. In June 1775, the Second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia to create the Continental Army—a unified colonial fighting force. This led to the creation of what was, essentially, the first American flag, the Continental Colors.

For some, this flag, comprised of 13 red and white alternating stripes and a Union Jack in the corner, was too similar to the British

flag. George Washington realized that flying a flag that close to the British flag was not a confidence-builder for the revolutionary effort, so he turned his efforts towards creating a new flag for the soon-to-be fledgling nation. On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress took a break from writing the Articles of Confederation and passed a resolution stating, "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white," with a union of "13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Over 100 years later, in 1916, President Woodrow Wilson marked the anniversary of that decree by officially establishing June 14 as Flag Day.

Juneteenth

June 19

Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. On June 19, 1865, Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston,



Texas, with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free. This was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, which became official January 1, 1863. The Emancipation Proclamation had little impact on the Texans due to the minimal number of Union troops to enforce the new Executive Order. However, with the surrender of General Lee in April of 1865, and the arrival of General Granger's regiment, the forces were finally strong enough to influence and overcome the resistance.

Juneteenth celebrates African American freedom and achievement while encouraging continuous self-development and respect for all cultures. As it takes on a more national, symbolic, and even global perspective, this national day of pride is growing.





There are practical learning moments that have informed my own work as professional chaplain in a health care setting and that have been helpful to let people know what it is a chaplain does. To start, a chaplain is trained to actively listen. A chaplain is present to people of all faiths or no faith. A chaplain is present to people for spiritual support, of course, yet also for emotional support. As many may have experienced, trained chaplains are Christian in background. But I've grown by and I appreciate that a fellow staff chaplain at the hospital is Jewish and more recently a new staff chaplain there is Buddhist.

A chaplain sees spirituality much larger than religion and a set of teachings. I find a nurse's definition of spirituality quite helpful to pass on and to use in my work: Spirituality is how we find meaning in life; connectedness with others (of course, family and friends); what gives one joy and 'floats one's boat' (reading, gardening, music, art, walking, cooking...I also throw in 'riding Harley Davidsons!' which a patient indeed shared with me once); oh yeah, and also how one experiences the transcendent (e.g. is God or a Higher Power in the picture?). I've had a patient in an outpatient infusion center even say that I could visit him so long as I didn't mention God! Still, with that lens of spirituality I wound up spending almost an hour with him and his wife. I learned what had given him strength and meaning in life thus far—those things would also be an ongoing source of sustenance and fortitude.

I've grown to appreciate the breadth of the human experience through this vocation. With each conversation along the way, fellow traveler, I appreciate you and look forward to learning more from you in coming open encounters.
